VILLAGE OF RIVER FOREST HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES

May 24, 2018

A meeting of the Historic Preservation Commission was held on May 24, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. in the First Floor Community Room at the River Forest Village Hall, 400 Park Avenue.

I. CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Upon roll call, the following persons were:

Present: Chairman Franek, Commissioners Popowits, Pritz, Graham-White, and Prestes

Absent: Commissioner Raino-Ogden

Also Present: Management Analyst Jon Pape

II. PUBLIC TESTIMONY

No public testimony was heard.

III. APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES –MARCH 22, 2018

A MOTION was made by Commissioner Prestes and SECONDED by Commissioner Graham-White to approve the meeting minutes for March 22, 2018 as presented.

AYES: Chairman Franek, Commissioners Popowits, Pritz, Graham-White, and Prestes

NAYS: None.

Motion Passes.

IV. REVIEW OF BROCHURE MAP DRAFT

Management Analyst Pape presented the most recent draft of the brochure map to the Commission. The Commission reviewed the content as well as various mockups of the size and stock of the final product. Management Analyst Pape reviewed the Commissioner's comments that were received on the last draft that had been incorporated in the current draft.

The Commission had a conversation related to how the homes would be numbered on the map in the brochure as well as to how those numbers would coordinate to the description layout next to the map. The Commission ultimately reordered the numbers of the homes and rearranged the descriptions. The numbering of the homes on the map was determined to proceed approximately west to east, but to also layout a path that someone could walk most easily to see the homes. The descriptions were reorganized to make them more logically found on the page.

V. DISCUSSION OF ADDITIONAL WAYS TO PROTECT SIGNIFICANT PROPERTIES

Chairman Franek presented to the Commission an idea to list for sale properties on the Village's website for properties that were either on the significant list or have won a historic preservation award in the past. It was explained that the goal of these listings would be for the purpose of advertising historic homes and education of their significance. Chairman Franek explained how the idea came from a request from a homeowner that is selling their home and from conversations he has had with preservationists in the area.

Commissioner Graham-White presented an idea to ensure the listing agent knows that it's a significant property. She felt that it could be a formal letter to the realtor informing them of the demolition delay. In response, Commissioner Pritz inquired if it could be required for a buyer to be informed that a listing is a significant property. Other Commissioners did not feel it could be required.

David Burns, 146 Keystone, shared his experience in renovating his home over the thirty-nine years of his ownership that he has now listed for sale. He expressed his frustration that he felt he had no means of protecting his home. Mr. Burns explained his experience in trying to find a relator that appreciated his home and the work that he had done. He also shared his knowledge of websites that hosted listed of historic homes for sale.

The Commission returned to the idea of trying to decide if it could be required that a designation of a significant property be required on a listing. Rather than a legal route, the Commission decided to first have a conversation with realtors in the community and how they might approach the purchase and sale of historic homes.

VI. OTHER BUSINESS

Chairman Franek discussed his concerns regarding a letter that appeared in the Wednesday Journal written by Commissioner Popowits regarding 747 William and historic preservation in the Village. Chairman Franek felt that Commissioner Popowits presented incorrect facts by stating the Commissioner reluctantly "signed off" on the demolition of 747 William. Chairman Franek corrected that the Commission did in fact deny the application for a certificate of appropriateness for the demolition of 747 William and imposed a maximum delay. Chairman Franek said the correction is important because Commissioner Popowits' letter may give the incorrect impression that the Commission approved the demolition of 747 William.

Commissioner Popowits stated that he thought Chairman Franek presented a legitimate criticism and agreed with the correction made. He felt the correction would serve the public interest.

Management Analyst Pape said that no applications were received. The Commission agreed that in a year where no noteworthy preservation efforts were completed, the Commission need not give an award.

Chairman Franek shared with the Commission that he has had conversations with staff and elected officials about having a conversation about the ordinances intended purpose of the six-month delay not being only punitive but rather a time to foster communication and search for alternatives. It was

discussed that a clarification of the ordinances intentions and the process timeline may be useful in the future.

At 8:22 Commissioner Graham-White left the meeting.

Chairman Franek stated that the Commissioner should gather and speak amongst themselves regarding any potential ordinance changes prior to preparing them to go to the Village Board.

In regards to the map brochure, Management Analyst Pape took some comments from Commissioner Prestes that were grammatical in nature. Management Analyst Pape stated that the changes would be made and circulated to the Commission. He also shared that the map brochure would be presented to the Village Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 11, 2018 for a consensus to proceed. It was agreed that Management Analyst Pape would make the presentation.

The Commission agreed that Chairman Franek would present his idea regarding the listings on the Village website to the Village Board of Trustees at the same time.

Management Analyst Pape informed the Commission that the Village was planning to put together short videos featuring preservation efforts in the community starting with the two homes that received a historic preservation award in 2017.

VII. ADJOURNMENT

A MOTION was made by Commissioner Prestes and SECONDED by Commissioner Pritz to adjourn the May 24, 2018 meeting of the Historic Preservation Commission at 8:37 p.m.

515 Auvergne Place (1893) Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright

*National Register of Historic Places Frank Lloyd Wright described the Winslow House, his first major commission as an independent architect after leaving Adler & Sullivan, as "the first prairie house." Beautifully preserved, this iconic structure echoes the land with its low hipped roof, plaster banding and Roman brick. It marked a revolutionary departure from earlier Victorian architecture.



530 Edgewood Place (1895) Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright

Known for its dramatic steep roof and massive chimney, in contrast to the horizontal eave line and string course, this Frank Lloyd Wright design was his first commission to show an Asian influence.



559 Edgewood Place (1910) Arch: William E. Drummond

*National Register of Historic Places Drummond, who was a member of the Wright studio from 1899 to 1909, designed the house for himself. The home is loosely based on a Frank Lloyd Wright design for a concrete home published in the Ladies Home Journal in 1907. It is one of the best examples of a prairie style house not designed by Frank Lloyd Wright.



738 Thatcher Avenue (1874) Arch: Unknown

This building is one of two grand Italianate villas in River Forest that were commissioned by Abraham Hoffman, one of the Village's most prominent early citizens. Established in 1931, the Trailside Museum of Natural History was the first public nature education facility of the Cook County Forest Preserves.



720 Keystone Avenue (1916) Arch: H.G. Fiddelke

This 8,000 square foot, Prairie Style mansion sits on one of River Forest's larger lots. In 1925 the stucco was covered in brick veneer, the home expanded and a unique "log cabin" was created on the third floor using whole bark covered logs



606 Keystone Avenue (1906) Arch: E.E. Roberts

With its brick ground story, and half-timbered upper stories, this E.E. Roberts design exhibits an exterior English cottage style, but with strong interior Prairie emphasis. The house was likely inspired by Wright's Nathan Moore House in Oak Park.



530 Keystone Avenue (1909) Arch: Robert C. Spencer A distinctive Robert C. Spencer design, the

John Broughton house is a refined example of the Prairie Style with intact art glass windows.



511 Edgewood Place (1858) Arch: Unknown

This historic Italianate house is the oldest residence in the village. Originally located at the intersection of Lake Street and Thatcher Avenue as a country home for David Thatcher, one of the earliest residents of the village, the house was moved to its present location circa 1900.



555 Edgewood Place (1945) Arch: William E. Drummond

The Ben Badenough house illustrates William E. Drummond's adaptability as an architect. Designed 35 years after his own house (directly north at 559 Edgewood), Drummond created a stately cottage design reflecting then current tastes in residential design.

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603 Edgewood Place (1908) Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright

Sometimes credited as being the first split-level house, the Isabel Roberts House is Frank Lloyd Wright's most significant Prairie house in River Forest. It possesses features typical of the mature Prairie style, including low hip roofs with broad overhanging eaves, continuous bands of windows and an overall emphasis on the horizontal line.



727 Keystone Avenue (1915) Arch: Spencer & Powers

The C.S. Pellet House combines Tudor, half-timbered architecture with Prairie School elements, and includes stained glass windows and ornamental floral designs under the roof and on the front. Before forming his own firm in 1905, Robert Spencer shared office space and was good friends with Frank Lloyd Wright.



706 Keystone Avenue (1900) Arch: E.E. Roberts

A distinctive E.E. Roberts design, illustrating the evolution of the Queen Anne style by incorporating strong geometric influences and Craftsman detailing.



562 Keystone Avenue (1909) Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright

The Ingalls House was designed by Frank Lloyd Wright for clients asking for maximum fresh air and light to help cure their children of tuberculosis A Greek cross design with subsequent rear additions by William E. Drummond (1926) and John Tilton (1981), the street view of the house has remained completely intact.



518 Keystone Avenue (1874) Arch: Unknown

One of the oldest surviving homes in the Village. Originally a yellow brick Italianate villa with a four-sided central tower and cupola with a side porte cochere for carriages. It was reconfigured for much of the twentieth century as a Spanish castle by the removal of the cupola, front porch and porte cochere. A twenty-first century restoration has returned much of the exterior to its original form.



517 Keystone Avenue (1915) Arch: William E. Drummond and Guenzel

The John Klesert house, designed by William E. Drummond, represents a prairie interpretation of a traditional 4-square home with a central fireplace. The house is well-proportioned with a unique diamond shaped attic window.



7970 Lake Street (1912) Arch: William E. Drummond


Designed by William E. Drummond, this Gothic-inspired brick church features Prairie ornamentation and detailing. Its low height makes the structure feel almost residentia in scale.



344 Keystone Avenue (1883) Arch: Unknown

MADISON STREET

This magnificent mansion is a beautiful example of the Italianate style that enormously popular in the U.S. from the 1850s until well into the 1880s.

1044 Forest Avenue (1929) Arch: Spencer S. Beman Jr. The house is built in a French Eclectic/Normar architectural style with Romanesque influence, reminiscent of farm houses in Normandy, France.

719 Clinton Place (1916) Arch: John S. Van Berger

The Seth Rhodes house is an excellent example of Prairie style architecture. Van Bergen worked for Frank Llovd Wright and supervised construction of the Robie House and the Mrs. Thomas Gale House before heading out on his own.



601 Bonnie Brae Place (1907) Arch: Tallmadge & Watson

Built in 1907 from plans prepared by Tallmadge & Watson. In 1919, Tallmadge reportedly revised the plans from this home for subsequent offering as a Sears catalog house.



1223-1227 Franklin Avenue (1955) Arch: Unknown

This pair of homes are a study in symmetry. Sharing one driveway, the homes are an excellent example of Mid-Century Modern shed design. Built by a father for his daughters, the houses achieved fame in a 1980s chewing gum commercial.



751 Franklin Avenue (1909) Arch: Tallmadge & Watson

Tallmadge & Watson designed this unusual, cruciform plan bungalow with overhanging eaves, which was featured in "House Beautiful" in 1911.

559 Ashland Avenue (1901)

Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright An early Frank Lloyd Wright prairie style design with a unique gabled roof and dramatic flared eaves. Built in 1901, the house is based on a design published in the July 1901 issue of Ladies' Home Journal.



735 Lathrop Avenue (1928) Arch: William E. Drummond

River Forest has been referred to as "Drummond country" because of the numerous examples of his work in the community. His designs were greatly influenced by Wright's Prairie School style.



628 Bonnie Brae Place (1909) Arch: Charles A. Purce

Designed by renowned Prairie Style architect William Gray Purcell for his parents in 1909, the house has a high-pitched roof with deep eaves. Windows made to resemble stained glass church windows add a Japanese sensibility.



306 Keystone Avenue (1882) Arch: Frank Lloyd Wright

*National Register of Historic Places One of three River Forest homes on the National Register of Historic Places, the William Hatch House is an outstanding example of Queen Anne residential architecture with Stick style elements.



7218 Quick Avenue (1906) Arch: Tallmadge & Watson


Tallmadge & Watson designed this Prairie School home in 1906. Its distinctive lap siding and cedar board and batten is further accentuated by leaded and stained glass windows.
